# Kansas Nonemployer Businesses 

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Nonemployers are businesses that have no paid employees and are subject to federal income tax. The majority of all business establishments in the United States are nonemployers, yet these firms average less than 4 percent of all sales and receipts nationally. ${ }^{1}$ Most nonemployers are self-employed individuals operating as sole proprietorships. However, nonemployers also include corporations and partnerships.

The Nonemployer Statistics data series originates from statistical information obtained through business income tax records that the Internal Revenue Service provides to the Census Bureau. The data are processed through various automated and analytical reviews to eliminate employers from the tabulation, correct and complete data items, remove anomalies, and validate geography coding and industry classification. ${ }^{2}$

## Number of Establishments

Nonemployer Statistics count each distinct business income tax return as an establishment. Although each establishment may have more than one physical location, it is counted as one firm in this data set.

In the state of Kansas, the highest annual average number of nonemployer businesses is in the other direct selling establishments industry. This industry consists of entities primarily engaged in retailing merchandise, for example, party plan merchandising, truck or wagon sales, and portable stalls. Other direct selling and child and day care services, the top two industries by annual average number of establishments, both have a very low value of receipts per establishment. ${ }^{3}$ This indicates that many of these businesses may not be the primary source of income for their proprietor's household.

${ }^{3}$ The value of receipts per establishment is the value of gross receipts divided by the number of establishments for each year for which data is available. Then, the annual average of those years is used to represent the receipts per establishment in that industry.

There are also a high number of establishments in the oil and gas extraction, insurance agencies and brokerages, and offices of real estate agents and brokers. These industries have a high number of establishments as well as a reasonably high value of receipts per establishment.

Growth in the number of nonemployer establishments can be volatile, depending on the industry. Between 2005 and 2007, hair, nail and skin care services added the most establishments, at 1,406. The lowest growth rate in hair, nail and skin care services was in 2008, at 0.1 percent, and then grew to 6.7 percent by 2010. The second highest growth in the number of establishments was in landscaping services, increasing by 1,130 establishments in six years. The growth rate swung from a low of 1.1 percent in 2006 , to a high of 25.3 percent in 2007.

Unlike the volatility in the number of establishments in the growth industries, the industries that are declining in the number of establishments have generally been steadily declining over the past seven years. Other direct sell establishments, with the largest loss of 2,455 establishments, had modest growth of 0.3 percent in 2005 and declined by at least 1.6 percent in all subsequent years. Likewise, the other personal services industry showed modest growth in 2005 and 2010, 1.4 percent and 1.8 percent, respectively, and moderate declines in all other years.

## Value of Receipts

The value of gross receipts in the nonemployer data set includes revenue from sales, commissions, and income from trades and businesses, as reported on annual business income tax returns. Business income consists of all payments received for services rendered. ${ }^{4}$

In the state of Kansas the highest annual average value of receipts is in the oil and gas extraction industry, 156 percent higher than the next highest revenue producing industry. This is due to both the high number of nonemployer establishments in the industry and the high value of receipts per establishment. The value of receipts in the oil and gas extraction industry has grown at an annual average rate of 4.5 percent over the past six years, although the value of receipts was $\$ 31$ million lower in 2010 than it was in 2004. This can be attributed to a 57.6 percent decline in the value of receipts in 2009.

[^0]The industry with the second highest annual average value of receipts of nonemployers is long-distance general freight trucking. This is due to the moderately high number of establishments and the high value of receipts per establishment. This is also one of the industries, along with local general freight trucking, that has experienced the most significant growth in receipts since 2004. In both of these trucking industries the growth in receipts can be attributed to an increase in the revenues, not an increase in the overall number of proprietors.

The increase in the value of receipts per establishment in the hair, nail and skin care services industry can be fully attributed to a growth in the number of establishments. The level of receipts per individual establishment has remained generally flat in this industry between 2004 and 2010.

The industry with the most significant decline in the value of receipts between 2004 and 2010 was the offices of real estate agents and brokers. This can be attributed to a significant decline in the number of establishments and in the revenue produced by each establishment.

The decline in the value of receipts for nonemployers in the full-service restaurant industry can be fully attributed to a decline in the revenue per establishment. The number of establishments in this industry has remained relatively flat over the last six years, with only six fewer establishments in 2010 than there were in 2004.

## Value of Receipts per Establishment

The value of receipts per establishment is the value of gross receipts divided by the number of establishments for each year for which data is available. Then, the annual average of those years is used to represent the receipts per establishment in that industry. With the exception of long-distance general freight trucking, many of the industries which produce a high value of receipts per establishment, have very few establishments in the state.

The industry, in Kansas, with the highest value of receipts per nonemployer establishment is land subdivision. This industry includes establishments primarily engaged in subdividing real property into lots, for subsequent sale to builders. It may include excavation work for the installation of roads and utility lines. Although this industry currently has the highest annual average receipts per establishment, it has also experienced one of the most significant declines in receipts per establishments since 2004.

Nonemployers in the fuel dealers industry have the fourth highest annual average receipts per establishment and have experienced the highest growth in receipts per establishment since 2004. Proprietors in this industry primarily engage in retailing heating oil, liquefied petroleum gas, and other fuels. The growth in the average revenue per establishment is due to significant increases in 2008, 2009 and 2010, when receipts per establishment grew by 21.1 percent, 22.1 percent and 45.4 percent, respectively.

Commodity contract brokerage has experienced the second highest level change in the value of receipts per establishment, of the Kansas industries for which data is available, although this increase was only 42 percent of that experienced by fuel dealers. The increase in the annual average receipts per establishment in this industry is due to significant growth in 2009 and 2010, when receipts per establishment grew by 31.5 percent and 31.4 percent, respectively. Receipts per establishment declined in two of the four years, 2005 through 2008.

The most significant decline in receipts per establishment in Kansas has been in the general rental centers industry. This industry primarily rents consumer, commercial and industrial equipment. The type of equipment rented can cover a broad range, from builders' tools to banquet supplies. Receipts per establishment in this industry have been volatile over the past six years. The lowest growth was in 2006 when receipts per establishment fell by 86.3 percent. The highest was in 2008 when there was an increase of 113.5 percent. Although the average annual growth rate was 9.6 percent, receipts per establishment were $\$ 85,219$ lower in 2010 than in 2004.
